The February 6, 2018 meeting of the Rockingham County Electoral Board was called to order at 10:00 a.m. in the Registrar's office by chair Linda Shuler. Electoral Board members attending the meeting were: Linda Shuler, Trish Philon, Vice Chair, Susan Threewitts, Secretary. Also in attendance was: Lisa B. Gooden, Director of Elections/Voter Registrar.

An updated list of Election Officers for 2018 was presented for consideration. A motion was made by Susan Threewitts, seconded by Trish Philon, and unanimously carried, to appoint the officers for 2018 as noted on the following pages.

The Board, after much deliberation and discussion, chose 104-Bergton as the Precinct of the Year for 2017.

#### Registrar's Report:

- ✓ Work has begun on the June 12 Primary (which is expected to be a dual).
- ✓ The office is currently working on a master list of instruction for Chiefs prior to the Primary in order that it is easier for them to delegate certain duties.
- ✓ The Deputy Registrar will be on maternity leave from March 5 – May 28. The usual helpers/part-timers will be working in the office during this time.
- ✓ The registrant count as of this meeting stands at 49,323.
- ✓ The Logic & Accuracy Testing for the June Primary will be on April 17 beginning at 9 a.m.
- ✓ Election Officer training will be May 21. Electoral Board members will arrive by 5:30 p.m. to verify ballots with Chiefs.

The Electoral Board recessed at 10:35 a.m. to meet in the Community Development room for a brief presentation by County Planner James May and GIS Technician Kendrick Smith regarding potential options if a new precinct is developed in Bridgewater. (A detailed report is outlined on the following pages.) Also attending: Jennifer Frederick, Deputy Registrar and William Pollard, Chief Election Officer for 401-Bridgewater.

After some discussion on possible precinct locations and also the redrawing of the precinct lines in Bridgewater, a motion was made by Susan Threewitts, seconded by Trish Philon, and unanimously carried, to visit possibly four locations in or near to Bridgewater at the next meeting: Bridgewater United Methodist Church, John Wayland Elementary School, Bridgewater Baptist Church, and the North River Library. The Voter Registrar will make calls to see if this will be feasible.

The next meeting of the Board was set for March 6, beginning at 9:30 a.m. and will include annual reorganization, consideration and approval of the Voting Machine Security Plan, followed by onsite tours of possible sites if an additional voting precinct is developed for Bridgewater.

The meeting adjourned at 11:20 a.m., upon a motion by Trish Philon, second by Susan Threewitts, and unanimously carried.

### Bridgewater Precinct Development Trends

#### **Current Unimproved Residential Lots**

This map shows the current residential lots available to build upon within the Town of Bridgewater. The 133 available lots are highlighted in yellow. On the 133 available lots, approximately 174 houses could potentially be built on the lots. The baseline for determining how many houses could be built on the larger parcels if divided is 3 houses per acre. The majority of the available lots lie north of Mt. Crawford Ave. These lots are primarily located within the subdivisions of Millview Estates (second phase not pictured), Parkside Village, and Windsor West. The majority of the larger parcels are located south of Mt. Crawford Ave and would need to be divided in order to accommodate more housing.

#### **Future Land Use**

This map was taken from the Town of Bridgewater's comprehensive plan. The gray color signifies the current town boundaries. The yellow, red, and pink colors signify future residential growth outside of the current town boundaries. The overwhelming majority is located north of Mt. Crawford Ave.

#### **Heat Map of Registered Voters**

This map was created using the voter data provided by the state and shows the locations of current registered voters. The data consists of 1610 unique addresses consisting of 3363 total voters. The red and orange colors represent the largest accumulation of voters. The red is centered on the Bridgewater Retirement complex. The larger yellow accumulations are centered on existing subdivisions. The majority of current voters lie south of Mt. Crawford Ave due to the number of voters residing in the Bridgewater Retirement complex.

#### **Housing Permits Applied for Since 2011**



This map shows the number of housing permits that have been applied for since 2011. The color scheme follows the same ramp as the heat map. The red and orange dots indicate a higher occurrence, while the blue and green dots indicate a lower occurrence. The color ramp is broken down by the year of application. The red and orange dots occur in 2015-2017 indicating the majority of housing permits have been applied for within the last three years. The map also includes a trend line using the same data. The trend line suggests that the number of house permits will continue to grow into the future. The majority of housing permits applied for since 2011 are located north of Mt. Crawford Ave, and primarily within the subdivisions of Millview Estates, Parkside Village, and Windsor West.


#### **Summary**


When comparing the four maps, future growth will be and recent growth is located primarily north of Mt Crawford Ave. Current registered voters are located primarily south of Mt. Crawford Ave. Due to the position of Mt. Crawford Ave, the data would suggest splitting the town in half using Mt. Crawford Ave as the divider. This would allow for the time being place the majority of voters in the southern half, while the large majority of potential voters would be located in the north half.
